A Summary of the 2018 Sampling Season

Greetings CCFRP Volunteers,

Greatly owing to your valued participation, we completed our second year of CCFRP surveys! In 2018 we had 68 volunteer anglers (32 new) join us on 8 hook-and-line surveys conducted inside MPAs and nearby reference areas off San Diego County. Volunteers spent 289.9 angler hours catching and releasing 918 fish (698 of these were tagged) representing 33 different species and allowing us to gather important information on species composition, lengths, and catch rates! Below are the top 10 largest species caught last season. Total lengths are listed along with angler, area, and site (MPA/REF).





Species Spotlight: Kelp Rockfish (Sebastes atrovirens)



Etymology and Colloquial Names: *Atrovirens* is Latin for "black" and "green", Sometimes referred to as "sugar bass" **Geographic Range:** Fort Bragg (Northern California) to Bahia San Carlos, and Islas San Benito (central Baja California); 98 ft to 269 ft **Maximum size:** 17 inches total length

Kelp Rockfish are often tan or brown, but you might see them in blackish, greenish, reddish, or even nearly white. This year on one of our Swami's surveys we caught a Kelp Rockfish that was bright yellow and black (photo below).

2018 Tag Returns

Tag returns are an exciting part of our program and one way that we learn about the movements and growth rates of the fish we catch and release on our surveys.

Anglers reported catching **23** of our tagged fish last year! One cool find was a Copper Rockfish originally tagged and released in the South La Jolla Reference Area on July 18, 2017 and recaptured near Marina Del Rey on December 24, 2018! As the crow flies, that's a distance of about 107 miles!

On your next fishing outing, be on the lookout for our tags -they are white and about 2 inches long, typically inserted on the left side of the fish. One side of the tag has our phone number, the other has the Tag ID number. If tags have been out for quite some time they may be fouled with algae and not as readily noticeable.



What to do if you catch a tagged fish:

- Record the Tag ID number and location (length, depth if possible)
- call 858-534-2156 and leave us a detailed message
- Let us know if you kept or released the fish (with or without tag)


